Social Assistance Review

In December 4 2008, the Ontario government made a commitment to “undertake a review of social assistance” as part of the province’s poverty reduction strategy. That commitment has not yet been translated into action so now is a great time to contact our elected representatives to urge action.

As a down payment towards addressing the gap between dangerously low social assistance rates and nutritional requirements, RNAO supports the introduction of a \$100 per month Health Food Supplement for adults receiving social assistance.
