

RNAO Comparison of Ontario Liberal, PC, NDP and Green Party Platforms May 30, 2014

The following table compares the published platforms of the four major provincial political parties with RNAO's key expectations for the next government as set out in RNAO's blueprint called "Visionary Leadership: Charting a course for the health system and nursing in Ontario" (link: <http://rnao.ca/vision>). Platform commitments in the table are based on the policies and costing available from the four party platform documents only. Only those commitments that address components of RNAO's Vision are included. Numbers in brackets correspond with the platform page on which the commitment is made (the Liberal platform is subdivided into sections a-h). This document will continue to be updated as further information from the above sources becomes available.

There is more detailed information on party positions. On May 9, 2014, RNAO sent 13 questions on health and nursing policy to the four Ontario political party leaders. Three parties responded to date, and their full responses was posted in the order of submission; Green Party, NDP and Liberal.
