

**RNAO Comparison of Ontario Liberal, PC, NDP and Green Party Platforms
Ontario Provincial Election 2018**

The following table compares the published platforms of the four major provincial political parties with RNAO's key priorities for the next government as set out in RNAO's 2018 [policy platform](#).

Platform commitments in the table are based on the policies and costing available from the respective political party's platform document. Only those commitments that address components of RNAO's policy platform are included. The platforms may be found at the following links (in order of their release): [NDP \(April 16, 2018\)](#), [Green Party of Ontario \(May 14, 2018\)](#), [Liberal \(May 26, 2018\)](#), and [PC \(May 30, 2018\)](#).
