

RNAO Comparison of Ontario Liberal, PC, NDP and Green Party Platforms Ontario Provincial Election 2018

The following table compares the published platforms of the four major provincial political parties with RNAO's key priorities for the next government as set out in RNAO's 2018 policy platform.

Platform commitments in the table are based on the policies and costing available from the respective political party's platform document. Only those commitments that address components of RNAO's policy platform are included. The platforms may be found at the following links (in order of their release): NDP (April 16, 2018), Green Party of Ontario (May 14, 2018), Liberal (May 26, 2018), and PC (May 30, 2018). The reader is encouraged to look at each of the platforms to see the full positions of each party.

Note: Numbers in square brackets correspond with the platform page on which the commitment is made; the Green Party platform and PC Party plan lack full page numbering, so page numbers generally do not appear beside commitments in these columns. RNAO has not edited any content. Formatting (e.g., bold) is as appears in the respective platforms.
